In 20 years, we have witnessed how partnering with our projects on pilot programs can lead to implementation on a vastly wider scale, thereby impacting a far greater number of children. Our partner projects have developed programs that have enabled passing of laws to provide mandatory Mental health care and developed board certified MBA curriculums for physically and mentally handicapped youth along with several specialized courses in vocational and computer skill training enabling them to get jobs and be self-sufficient.



We are growing and expanding our efforts in improving the lives of the most marginalized. HOH provides funding to rescue, rehabilitate and provide vocational training for Job skills to victims of human trafficking. HOH has gone environmentally green. We are instrumental in planting over 15000 trees and water harvesting.

During COVID we campaigned to raise funds to provide meals and medical help to migrant workers and their families. We mobilized school education by supplying smart phones and laptops to students in the slums. Our partners made sure that education remained uninterrupted and created innovative online classes and lessons on YouTube. Our hearing and speech impaired program ramped up their outreach efforts to the rural villages in Punjab and provided web education with online individualized sessions for the students.

HOH has been the pillar of strength for our programs by funding them 100 percent this year. We could achieve this because of your long term allegiance and strong support. This year has been a challenge for us all. We work harder to survive and make sure all our hard work of the past 20 years succeeds and thrives. Our children are a living proof. We have lived and reveled in their struggles and success. Many of them have made it to top universities and some are here in the Silicon Valley. TIMELINE

2000

HOH established partnership with Manovikas in the year 2000, by co-creating and funding major programs. A small day care center then, operating out of a basement, for mentally challenged destitute children. Today MV is a highly reputable Institution in India with phenomenal accomplishments in being the voice for the people with intellectual and development disabilities (IDD)

2005

2004

HOH rescued the Chikankari Learning Center in Mijwan, which then consisted of a shed with few broken sewing machines on a torn carpet. HOH built bathrooms and revived the sewing/embroidery program by employing teachers, buying new sewing machines, opened bank accounts for each girl and paid 200INR stipend(4USD) to every girl to encourage attendance. It was surprising how the incentive worked, because the parent-in-law would volunteer to babysit the children. HOH's vision and innovation resulted in the center transforming from a simple training center into a production center, paving way for earning a sizable income for the girls. Dr.Nilima Sabharwal's visit to Children Home of Hope, Chennai, India. A dilapidated bathroom and many cases of gastroenteritis among children prompted Dr.Sabharwal to raise funds to build a bathroom. Healthy children, a heartening outcome prompted her to set up a 501(C)3 charity, Home of Hope Inc in California, to raise funds and to serve more children in need.

HOH partnered with Delhi based Udayan Care, and was the first to support the Mental Health Program to look after the physical, mental and emotional well being of children by addressing their physiological and psychological needs.

In 1999 Udayan Care was a single home with just 10 orphan girls.

In 2004, HOH partnered with ATMS, Bangalore and provided the students with uniforms and shoes.

HOH set up a first computer lab in ATMS, which was funded by the Husain family (Rubina Karnad Husain), to honor the memory of her late husband Dr Abid Husain.

Millions of children in India have to grow up without electricity, clean water, and proper nourishment. A retired city-based couple, Mr & Mrs Pendharker, pondered how they could help these children. "It was out of question for us to provide electricity, water or roads to their deprived world. But surely we could bring some cheer to the inner-city children, by offering them a glimpse

of the 'Wonderful World of Books'. Books with pictures, songs, and knowledge". Thus the 'Village Mobile Library", Paanpoee was initiated with carefully curated books covering topics of Geography, Math, Health and Hygiene, Science and Environment, History and Heroes, Current and World Events providing the children with a kaleidoscope of knowledge, helping to shape their personality and enhance their learning.

HOH adopted PaanPoee, fulfilling their request of waterproof library bags.

HOH created an exchange program with CEID-Center for Early Intervention on Deafness, in Berkeley CA and Pingalwara Deaf School in Amritsar India, enabling the Pingalwara team to pioneer a unique digitized Sign Language software program in Punjabi available in rural villages.

PaanPoee Vachanalaya Program, working in conjunction with the Vanasthali Rural Development and HOH were delivering 4,500 books not only to children but adults too in remote rural areas. Teachers, nicknamed as book fairies, would pick up the books at the Library centers, and carry them in rain or in burning sun, on foot or on their bicycles in HOH canvas bags to make sure each child has the joy of holding a new book in their hands, and learning to read.

2009

Koshish (endeavour) is an integrated development project for underprivileged children and women living in a slum in South Delhi. In 2009 HOH partnered with KOSHISH to fund the after school program and the vocational training courses in the local computer training institutes.

2010

In 2010 the Mljwan-HOH embroidery center was adopted by famous Indian fashion designer Manish Malhotra giving employment opportunities and a new dimension of living to hundreds of village girls. Currently many new embroidery centers have opened in Varanasi, Amethi and Ambari, empowering and freeing the village girls from child labor.

Saidham was founded by Dr. Motilal Gupta in 2004. Free education at SaiDham school included a unique "Help the Family and community" program, which extended enhanced help, like providing clothing, life insurance, medical care, facilitated marriages of their daughters and included the entire family on fun excursions and outings. This motivated the parents to send their children to school and not make them work as "servants" to contribute to the family income. In 2010 Dr. Nilima Sabharwal, visited SaiDham and she was very impressed by the vision and the ideals of it's Founder and Chairman, Dr. Motilal Gupta. HOH funded \$30,000 to provide 25 new computers. Students were taught basics of computer in partnership with NIIT(National Institute of Information Technology).

Paanpoee Mobile Library - In 2010 HOH funded a van to reach 1000 more students in the interiors of small villages where children of migrant workers and tribal population lived.

In 2015, ATMS -Abid Hussain computer lab was upgraded by HOH, with state of the art computer systems.

2013

In 2013 HOH initiated a sports program under the leadership of 13 yr old Gurbaz Sandhu, member of HOH Youth Chapter, who was able to plant the love of sports in the girls, who had never participated in any team games. He funded sports shoes for each one of them and arranged for a proficient in house coach in Mijwan.



Paanpoee Mobile Library Project - HOH added a new colorful dimension by delivering 50000 Disney Books for the children. This brought about a fervor of excitement amongst the children, teachers and parents.

HOH partnered with Sunder Shewak Sabha in the year 2014. SSS gives aid, assistance, loan, guidance and encouragement to youth to opt for careers in Engineering, Medicine, Chartered Accountancy, Cost Accountancy, Company Secretary and many vocational training courses.

E2E((Educate To Empower) an initiative launched to teach English remotely by teachers from Bay Area to the students in ATMS. The effects of these programs have been very rewarding and fruitful. The teachers give glowing reports about the confidence in the students while speaking English with good grammar making this program very successful. During the same year, a broadband upgrade aided by HOH made the virtual lessons and interaction seamless.



The Aaryaman Computer Lab was established in the year 2015 in memory of our Founder DR. Nilima Sabharwal's Nephew, a child with special needs who passed away at the young age of 14. The lab is supported by the family donations and HOH. The goal is to teach employable computer skills to the students with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) at Manovikas. Since it's inception, over 400 students have had access to computer education and certification courses.

The same year Manovikas was able to secure SCPwD (Skill Council for Persons with Disabilities) the most prestigious affiliation certificate issued by the Government of India. Manovikas was one among the first in the country to be bestowed with this recognition emblem on the certificate. A valuable certificate for persons with disability to get employed. The affiliation fee was donated by a generous donor from HOH.

2016

Manovikas is a pioneer and enabler for major laws and policy changes in India like the Disability Act Law of 2016, which mandates 1% reservation in jobs for persons with intellectual disabilities.

This law assists in the employment for 2.1% of India's mentally challenged population.

Pingalwara Outreach Effort started in 2017. HOH is funding the operating expenses of 5 outreach centers and bought tablets for the teachers to conduct online classes during COVID. The successful outcome of this effort is educating the children who could not go out to schools. The number of students who are signing up is increasing. Parents are also getting involved in the education process with online classes.

Outreach effort locates hearing impaired children and work with their parents so they send them to school. Make arrangements for children to come to school. Locate a primary school which can serve multiple villages (typically 10-15). Train the teachers in local school and monitor progress over skype as well as in-person visit In the villages.

In February 2017, Bay Area entrepreneur Vinita Bhandari, Founder of Building Kidz Schools, collaborated with HOH and selected Saidham as it's first project in India. Building Kidz incorporates a high level of academics with performing arts and extracurricular activities to create a loving nurturing environment that inspires character, confidence and lifelong love of learning.

2018

HOH partnered with Prajwala in the year 2018 to rehabilitate and reintegrate the victims of human trafficking by funding vocational training, higher education and professional courses. In 2017 HOH launched a cultural drama and public speaking program funded by Bollywood actress Ashvini Bhave which helped in enhancing the creative potential of the girls from rural areas near Mijwan. They staged plays to bring awareness with social messages.

Udayan Care Graphic Design Center was established in memory of Kanwar Chadha's dear Father in 2017. The center was established with an objective to benefit and train 50 underprivileged youth in a year for Graphic Design Certification

2018

Mijwan village is the nidus for innovation and social change. The Sports program in Mijwan has blossomed into a Sports Academy, with professional coaches. The parents of these girls who once opposed this program are now standing in line to enroll their children. Gurbaz is running the sports program from his college dorm and is committed for life to continue this work in college and beyond. Generous donors from HOH have funded the construction of a state of the art indoors badminton court in Mijwan Village. Today, these girls are in excellent physical condition and have won the Badminton Championship at the inter school open in Aligarh. The village girls are now empowered with an indomitable spirit that has been nurtured by compassion of the donors.

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SMILE was launched in partnership with Manovikas, New Delhi. A daycare center and education center for developmentally delayed special children.

SMILE, an inspiring initiative by the youngest member, 11 year old Amora of the HOH Youth Chapter (YC), to read stories, teach dance, sing songs with them through skype, with an adult supervision on both sides.



2020

The SMILE CITY Team is rapidly growing and has more than 10 members. This program has transcended borders and connecting virtually from thousands of miles away, Amora and team of righteous leaders and members across the country, bring smiles to children through a combination of fun-filled lessons, musical and theatrical entertainment, and action-packed quick bits.

COVID-19 HOH + Partners

Unprecedented times calls for adaptable responses. Our project partners swiftly rose to the pandemic challenges. With donors' compassionate contribution, we are helping those in need and we are doing remarkable work. Collectively we have served 317,410 individuals, distributed 326,200kg of food, 77,750 face masks and PPEs.





OUTH HAPTER How old were you when you went to Mijwan and what was your initial reaction when you saw the school?

I was 14 years old when I first went to Mijwan in July 2014. School as such was better than I had expected given it was in a remote village in India. As compared to the rest of rural India, the students were a very confident bunch of girls. and the staff was very eager to incorporate new programs to enhance the overall standard of the school. Since I was there to teach them English, I came up with the idea of teaching them English through sports so it would be more fun and engaging.



THE KAIFI AZMI SPORTS ACADEMY

The Kaifi Azmi Sports Academy is not just a dream project - it is soon to be a reality. I along with an amazing team at HOH & Mijwan are determined to achieve this lofty goal.

I was very surprised that the girls did not have the basic skills for playing sports like Soccer, but after a few basic instructions and coaching, they picked it up very quickly. I was able to teach them the basic soccer terminology and communicate with them in English which was the main objective. I was inspired by their enthusiasm and the support I got from the Mijwan team, so I decided to take this to the next level. In 2017 - Gurbaz Sandhu, President, HOH Youth Chapter



How did you interact and engage the students?

I gave them first the general basic knowledge about sports specifically soccer then I quizzed them to see if they were able to understand and retain the information. To my surprise, they had picked this up very quickly, and seeing the response I took them to the field and started coaching them. To engage them I kept prizes as an incentive to pay attention and learn which worked well. They picked up the game fairly quickly and seeing their interest in sports my journey to build the sports academy started

Why did you choose sports?

I am a sports fanatic and enjoy both playing and watching sports. I have played sports since the age of 5 years. On my yearly trips to India, I would play sports with the neighborhood kids, some of who were under-privileged kids but were the best players in the group. This made me realize that under privileged children needed an outlet to have fun and grow their skills, and sports would be an ideal platform to make this happen.

What impact have you seen since starting the Mijwan sports program?

Since the summer of 2014, my journey has proven to be extremely impact-full. The summer camp has led to a full-fledged sports academy today where national and international level athletes are expected to be trained. This academy is a platform for all disadvantaged children to reach their full potential. The academy is the only sports institute for disadvantaged children at this level in the entire state of UP.

What is your vision of the academy in the coming years?

My plans are to hold national/international level training camps and other events like for example, talent hunts or annual competitions with rewards and incentives such as scholarships for full training for the winners. I also plan on getting national and international level coaches and building alliances with national/international level institutes to provide coaching and placement in various professional or state/country level teams. Eventually, I would like to start a league for disadvantaged children only. *"I want to place a smile on these kids' faces and let them know that they are not different. My goal is to expand this and recruit other friends to help because kids can connect with other kids. SMILE is the key to the heart and we want to help in spreading the SMILE."*



HOH YOUTH CHAPTE

The support provided by Home of Hope to our Mental Health Programme has been imperative in bringing about positive mental health to over 1250 children and young adults who have been raised in our Udayan Ghar Programme. Not only have these children been able to develop as independent individuals with behavioral, emotional and psychological stability; we have also been able to develop valuable documentation on the subject of mental health. Moreover, Home of Hope has been instrumental in nurturing the potential of many Udayan Shalini Fellows to achieve higher education and well-paying jobs, as well as bringing digital literacy and skill development to our youth in Udayan Care IT Centres and Skill Development Centres.

SIGNIFICANT OUTCOME AS A RESULT OF PARNERSHIP WITH HOH

Development of sign language for hearing impaired would have been possible only due to the knowledge partnership with CEID, facilitated by Home of Hope. Two sign language books have been published and third one is getting ready to go to press. A website with sign language has been operational for the past 10 years. Outreach Program funded by Home of Hope enabled hearing impaired children, parents and teachers in remote villages had access to learning resources, and training. Five satellite schools are operational in places where there is a lack of adequate infrastructure for schools.

Awareness campaign to encourage educating hearing impaired children has produced positive results in 120 villages near Amristar, Punjab

RP SINGH, FOUNDER, ADARSH SCHOOL FOR DEAF CHILDREN

Initially, HOH partnership/funding took care of the basic needs of the children in CHOH such as food, shelter, medical, maintenance, operational cost, conveyance, as well as Tanya Primary School in the same building as CHOH. Subsequently, the priority for HOH shifted to Teachers Salaries and Education (as Tanya Primary School became a full-fledged English Medium School). CHOH was now able to employ highly qualified and experienced English-speaking Teachers. This definitely helped in improving the quality of Education by giving the children a good foundation in all aspects of learning, soft skills, and holistic development. A good foundation proved to be a stepping stone for the children to do well in Middle and High School, resulting in most of the children opting for Higher Education. Here again, thanks to HOH funding, the ambition of children who enrolled for Higher Education was achieved in the fields of Engineering, Finance, Business Administration, Chartered Accountancy, Teaching, Medical-Lab Technicians, Nursing, Physiotherapy, Biomedical Science.
